

Emphasis will be on the justification defenses outlined in chapter 4 of the criminal code. The seminar will provide case-specific examples to illustrate some problematic, overlapping features of justification defenses, with discussion of recent legislative amendments, and tips on how to avoid reversal in cases where a defendant raises numerous justification defenses. The seminar will also briefly cover emerging issues in other cases where a trial court has committed some error pertaining to jury instructions, and offer tips about how to avoid reversal.
